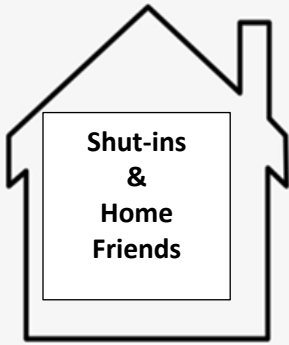

Recently our District Superintendent, Cathy Mitchell, informed the Landrum SPRC of the intention to move Pastor Dalton to Trinity U.M.C. in Bamberg.

Virus Update

This week marked the one-year anniversary of the World Health Organization declaring the Covid-19 virus a pandemic. It has been a challenging year for everyone to say the least. During this time, we had to close in person services for several weeks. Once we restarted, we followed the guidelines from the Conference for reopening and have modified them as appropriate as we learned more and as circumstances changed.

We want to provide an update on the current guidelines we are following as well as an update on the things we can and cannot do at this point.

Below is a list of our current practices.

We ask everyone to practice social distancing. Sitting together by family or households is ok and encouraged.

We have installed hand sanitizers in the Narthex and other locations in the facility.

We have masks available for anyone who would like one for worship service. It is an individual choice for wearing masks in worship.

We have installed advanced air purifiers in the heating and cooling system. These purifiers use ultraviolet light to sanitize the air and surfaces in the facility. We have a total of 7 of the units.

We use single serving cups for Communion.

We have been taking temps as you enter the Sanctuary. We are going to discontinue this activity. No one has tested with a high temperature since we started this activity, and it is not included in the Conference guidelines.

We ask anyone with any cold or Flu like symptoms to not attend that day and join us for worship on-line.

With these things in place, today we are able to;

Meet for Sunday School.

Gather in the sanctuary for worship.

Have music in worship including piano, organ, handbells.

Recite the Lord's Prayer together.

Receive Communion together.

Sit together as families or households.

Hold committee meetings.

Complete the Community Meal, Food Distribution and Backpacks ministries with takeout and delivery.

Send cards, make phone calls, use the Lamplighter and the online sermons to communicate and reach out to the congregation and our community.

There is much we can and are doing safely but there are still some things aren't able to do yet;

We aren't able to sing indoors including the choir or as a congregation. We can sing outdoors and are planning an outdoor service for Easter. Joy and the Choir are providing beautiful music for our services with the piano, organ, hand bells and guitar.

We aren't able to shake hands or hug each other. We still need to maintain the 6-foot distances with each other outside of our family or household.

We aren't able to have visitation at homes or in the hospital.

Most of us have never faced anything like this. Our church leadership has met on a regular basis from the beginning of the pandemic, and we continue to meet on a regular basis. We have adjusted practices and activities as we learned more over the year and will continue to do so until we are back to normal.

I am the current Lay Leader and Ted Andrus is the current Lay Leader to Annual conference. Our responsibilities include sharing your voice at the Administrative Council, with the Pastor and with the Conference so please let us know if you have questions, suggestions, or concerns about any of the current practices.

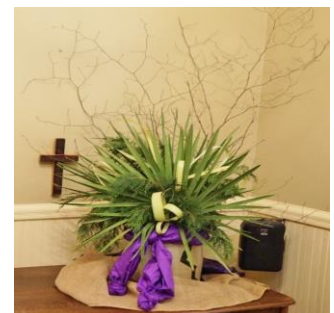

Finance: Mark

Payroll: Staff pay was to remain at 2020 level until authorized by PPRC and council. (2021 budget was a 3% line item increase.) We are now going to reinstate the 3% increase to staff salaries and make it retroactive to January.

Cheryl brought up the need for a fund to assist individuals who have no family or friends available to help with home care after a hospitalization or accident. Cost for CNAs for a specific amount of time could be provided. After discussion council agreed that this was a good idea. She will research this and report at the next meeting.

Administrative Council

Glenn opened with a question: What do we do when we are hit with a test? Don's panic. God uses it to make us stronger.

Finance: Mark

Scholarship: Two graduating seniors: James Wofford and Patrick Clark. Bibles for presentation are here. Update on church bus purchase: Having a bus would be a major plus for the church. Example is choir as Joy has received requests for the choir to sing at different venues. Discussion on logistics of usage. A suggestion was to lease a bus for a year or two to determine need. No decision.

Missions: Jody

Jody checked with Susan Henderson at OP Earle to identify any students who may wish to play baseball, but families can't afford the fees and equipment. In her contacts with families, she found there were children who wanted to take karate, gymnastics, and other ongoing activities. Discussion concluded that it was not feasible to pay for activities that require ongoing monthly fees. But to limit payment for seasonal enrollment fees.

Motion by Lou for a \$500 discretionary spending fund to assist families with the purchase of outfits, equipment etc. for participation in ongoing activities. Second Jaime. Approved.

We are sponsoring a youth baseball team this season. This will include fees and equipment for children on the team. Motion by Mark to sponsor a Landrum youth girls softball team. Second Jaime. Approved.

Worship: Cheryl Barto (by letter)

Deb and I are excited with the Lenten series "Broken Vessels" which Pastor Kevin has chosen, and hope that our efforts on the altar and in the Narthex have been complimentary to his theme.

Palms have been ordered for the Palm Sunday service and should arrive by March 23.

After Maundy Thursday service, we will need a few helping hands to place the black window covers for Good Friday eve service as well as dismantling afterwards.

Easter lilies have been ordered for Easter Sunday outdoor altar. There are sign-up sheets in the Narthex for those wishing to reserve a lily in honor or memory of someone. These may be picked up after the service. If a shut-in is to receive the flower, we will see that they are delivered. Names of those who ordered flowers and for whom they are ordered will be read during announcements.

There will be a need for helping hands Easter morning as the "outdoor sanctuary" is set up with chairs etc. Thanks to Mark for the use of a flatbed as an altar.

We will be using the flower cross again this year and encourage those attending the service to bring flowers to place on it. Flowers will be available for those who don't have blossoms.

This is a perfect service to hold outdoors, and we are very hopeful that the weather cooperates. A lot of work goes into an event such as this, and we offer a heartfelt thank you to all who help make it possible.

Administrative Council continued

Lay Leader: Wayne

The conference Covid update presented by Wayne this morning came from PPRC. One noted change is that we are no longer taking temperatures as people enter the sanctuary.

A list of committee chairmen and phone numbers will be published in the Lamplighter to assist those with questions in those areas.

Trustees: Jaime

Two AEDs (defibrillators) have been purchased. \$1200 each with a four-year battery life. One placed in the sanctuary and one in the FLC. Some people are trained on usage. Open for others to learn.

WiFi thermostats have been installed enabling settings to be monitored remotely.

Looking for better lighting for the parking lot. Perhaps more decorative.

Some of the classrooms upstairs in the FLC will now be used for the choir. There will be a designated room for the hand bells which can be secured. A handicap chairlift will be installed on the stairs. Cost \$7000.

Jacob Boatwright has been named Music Trustee for bells. He will report to Trustees every quarter.

Lou mentioned that Men's club can no longer handle spreading mulch around the property. Jaime will give the responsibility to the landscaping company who takes care of the property.

Music: Joy

Bells will be delivered tomorrow. There will be a dedication next Sunday. The group have named themselves "Belles of Landrum United Methodist Church". Another group is forming who will practice during the day. The choir and bells will both perform on Easter Sunday.

PPRC: Pete

PPRC voted to reinstate salary increase for Kevin and Joy. (See Finance committee notes above.)

The Covid guidelines that Wayne presented this morning will go in the Lamplighter.

Men's Ministry: Lou

Lou spoke with the owner of the local laundromat and found it is not feasible for us to do vouchers to pay for individual's laundry.

Last year the ministry paid the lunchroom balances for several families at OP Earle. Lou would like to expand the program this year to include Campobello-Gramling, Tryon Elementary, Sunny View and Polk Central. Joy said Sunny View is already sponsored by a church in Polk County.

Motion by Lou to pay (up to \$1500 per school) lunchroom balances for OPE, Campobello-Gramling, TE, and Polk Central. Second by Pete. Approved. Lou will contact school principals to determine need. Jody will call Tryon Elementary.

Pastor's Report: Kevin

After seeing the item in last month's Lamplighter regarding construction of laundry/shower facility, a member of the congregation approached Kevin regarding funding the project.

Discussion on construction, logistics of usage. (Some not in favor of showers.) Discussion on a remodel of 223 next door to accommodate a laundry facility and perhaps also use for music. A committee has been formed to explore use of 223. (Jaime, Mark, Lou, Kevin).

No further business. Meeting adjourned.

Is there a Doctor in the House?!

I was surprised when I first learned that Luke (of Luke's gospel) was a physician. Before Jesus healed one person, Luke had a hand in healing many, especially Paul. He knew the satisfaction of diagnosing people's ailments and prescribing treatments restoring them to health. Doctor Luke also knew failure. Sometimes all his knowledge and skill made no difference.

As a physician Luke had to deal with both these realities. But in Jesus, he saw something which would change how he dealt with people. It changed his view about life all together...so much so that he would be remembered not as Luke the physician, but Luke the evangelist. I knew nothing about his medical practice and knew him from the stories he recorded about shepherds keeping watch over their flocks by night, the Good Samaritan, and the prodigal son.

Under the influence of Jesus, the doctor became a disciple and recorded what he heard, saw, and experienced with the greatest clarity he could, not because people love good stories, but because these stories had the power to change, to heal, and to save lives. The irony may be that Luke healed more lives as an evangelist than as a doctor. As his stories were passed along more lives were healed and new stories were created.

Think for a moment about how many of us came to our faith because of a little something someone said. "I know things are tough for you right now and I will include you in my prayers", or "There's no way I could ever keep my crazy life together without my Christian friends."

You may not be a medical doctor, but you have a license to practice evangelism! An evangelist is simply someone with a good word about something that makes a difference; something that helps and heals. Being an evangelist is living because of that good news, letting others get little glimpses of the life of Christ in our own lives. Great work comes in little doses and deeds...sitting by the bed of a sick friend, offering a single mom childcare so she can do something for herself for a change, telling someone who hurts that you will pray for them. We need people to open their mouths and hearts and give witness to what is inside of you.

The next time you're asked what you do for a living, get into the habit of telling yourself, "I am licensed to practiced medicine," because you are...gospel medicine. Luke the doctor changed his profession to an evangelist, and as a result played a part in curing more ills than he could ever have imagined. We can too. As the good news has been passed to us, it is up to us to pass it to others. It's in our Hippocratic oath. It's part of the promise we made to Christ when we were baptized and turned from teachers and preachers, and firemen and foremen, and nurses and doctors into His disciples. So...is there a doctor in the house?
