Pastor's Message

Dear Friends of Landrum UMC,

While I know that you nor I can ignore that this church will be coming together to take a vote about remaining a UMC or leaving the denomination on Sunday, January 21, 2024, 11am. I hope that as you continue to serve God and tell others about Jesus and pray, you will find peace about your decision. Perhaps thinking about that phrase that became popular on a few years ago, "What Would Jesus do?" (WWJD) might give you some guidance.

We have journeyed to celebrate the birth of Jesus during Advent and then beginning on Christmas Eve or Day (depending on who you talk with) those 12 Days of Christmas began ending on January 6th, Epiphany. The story of Jesus' birth and life is somewhat like a puzzle that has to be put together for us to fully understand. We have heard about angels giving instruction to various ones, Mary and Joseph, the shepherds, the wise men, and about stars in the sky that they were to follow. Sometimes the pieces of the story did not always fit ours, like the wise men were not yet there when Jesus was born but came when he was a young child. The messages are important and always pointing to Jesus.

I hope the "pieces of the story" of Jesus' birth are coming together for you. As Addie and I put our "Christmas Puzzle" which had 1000 pieces together, it was easy to think you had the right piece in the right place and yet you did not! We began on Christmas Day and put the last piece in on New Year's Day! Sometimes we tried to "make" pieces fit. Well, they were so similar. Yet upon closer examination, it really was too hard to put in, there was just a little too much space on one side, an edge was lifted and not flat as it should be. Almost, but not the right one!

During Advent the Sunday scriptures brought us back to John the Baptist, before he and Jesus were born, and later when they were grown men and John, who was a great preacher with many followers, kept reminding them when they asked if he was the One they were waiting for, no he told them he was pointing the way to the One.

If the puzzle that is your life just seems not quite right, maybe a piece is missing or out of place, just maybe the piece of your life puzzle that you need is Jesus! When Jesus came up from the waters of his baptism, "a voice from heaven said, 'This is my Son, the Beloved, with whom I am well pleased.'" (John 2: 17).

Join us on Sundays at 10am (and other times!) as we are becoming "The People of God", putting Jesus first in our lives and becoming his disciples and sharing the Good News with others.
